We all feel forgotten sometimes. Saddest line in the Bible is when Christ asks God why

He forsook Him. I think Jesus was forgotten, so that we would be remembered. However, the empty tomb tells us that He was remembered too.

Going through the season of Lent reminds us that we never know what direction life will take. We never know everything there is to know. Only solution is doing your best and trust God for the rest.

Going through Lent helps us to understand all the years of Godwork that go into making one's life a thing of beauty. A lot of shaping, a lot of smoothing, a lot of finishing. And if we rush the process, the flaws will surely show.

The congregation is to be congratulated for their generosity on donating money for relief efforts in Haiti after the devastating earthquake.

Membership donated \$400 to pay for health kits (46). These will be or have already been forwarded to the Haiti people.

Cash was collected for UMCOR to be used for Haiti projects. The congregation donated \$1,106 for UMCOR's use in Haiti, 100% of this money will be used on Haiti projects.

According to a charity watch dog Organization, UMCOR is rated A+ in the usage of funds. All money is used for projects and not for Administrative costs or solicitation of funds. Very few charities are rated this highly.

Neighborhood House Food pantry membership are asked to continue bringing in canned and dry food items for the food pantry. The need continues to be great.

#### Texas surgeon conducts 50 surgeries in Haiti

SUGAR LAND, Texas — United Methodist orthopedic surgeon Dr. Michael Kent, 35, was part of a four-person surgical team that spent five days in Jimini, a Dominican Republic town bordering Haiti. He conducted 50 surgeries before returning to his home in Sugar Land, Texas.

#### **Red Bird Mission School may close**

BEVERLY, Ky.—Red Bird Mission School may close its doors at the end of the school year. "We've been struggling for a couple of years," said Tonya Asher, school secretary. "We're praying and hoping things will work out." A Save Our Schools Committee and others are trying raise the money to keep the 89-year-old school in the Appalachian mountains in southeastern Kentucky afloat.

### African Church in war zone grows by 588 percent in five years

KORHOGO, <u>Côte d'Ivoire</u> — There is every reason for a church to fail in this rebel-held area in the mountainous north central region of this African nation. It has been the scene of many armed conflicts between government and rebel forces. Nevertheless, the United Methodist Church in the district increased from 300 members in 2005 to 2,065 members today.

#### Haitians pause to mourn losses from quake

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti — The people of Haiti took three days of remembrance, Feb. 12 to 14, to mourn their losses from the Jan. 12 earthquake. People dressed in white and spent from 6 a.m. until early afternoon at church singing and praying.

### **United Methodist honored for protecting immigrants**

SEATTLE (UMNS) — Llewelyn Pritchard was dismayed by what he considered to be Gestapo-like tactics used on immigrants to the United States. Armed with a \$1 million grant from the Ford Foundation, the Seattle attorney chaired a committee on immigration law reform for the American Bar Association. In February, the association honored Pritchard for his social justice work.

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
