'God is bigger than this oil spill'

The Rev. Jack Kale likes to begin his sermons with a joke.

But on Sunday, as the Worship at the Water pastor stood before his congregation at Flounder's Chowder House, there was little to laugh about.

"I don't have a joke today," he told the large crowd gathered on Flounder's windy, outdoor decks. "Today, my heart is breaking."

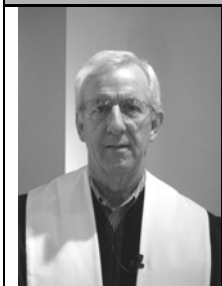
Worship at the Water, the popular Gulf Breeze United Methodist Church extension ministry, holds weekly services at the Pensacola Beach restaurant. In light of the BP oil spill, Kale focused Sunday's message on the environment.

"Was anyone else really depressed last night?" he asked attendees, who nodded in response. "But everyone here understands that God is bigger than this oil spill. We give our hearts to God, even when it's hard."

Kale's emotional plea for healing and divine intervention brought many in the crowd to tears. Standing near the pulpit, longtime Gulf Breeze United Methodist Church member Arnie Kendall expressed his frustration with the impending disaster

"Being Extraordinary In Ordinary Time"

That's right folks, here we are again in that season

the church calls "Ordinary Time", the season after Pentecost. The first Sunday is always Trinity Sunday and the

last Sunday is always Christ the King Sunday on November 21. 25 Sunday's. "Whew" that's a lot of "Ordinary Time".

The Christian year contains two cycles: The Christmas Cycle (Advent-Christmas-Epiphany) and the Easter Cycle (Lent-Easter-Pentecost) After each cycle there is an "ordinary time" of growth symbolized by the

color green. So.....Green represents growth and the significance of the church as a sign of God's continuing presence and activity in the world, and is used during "Ordinary Time". Got It? Good, I knew that you would.

Now back to Pentecost. Ah, Pentecost. That was the day

that God began to pour out his Holy Spirit and He's never ever stopped since. Over the years, we have seen the Spirit come in many ways in our lives. Sometimes like that day, sometimes quietly, sometimes in great joy. But it's the presence of the Spirit, the Spirit of God, that matters, not our emotions or the circumstances. I know you agree with me on that.

And, oh by the way, "our" Cross and Flame emblem, with dual tongues of fire is rich in meaning. It relates the United Methodist Church to God through Christ (cross) and the Holy Spirit (flame). The flame is a reminder of Pentecost when witnesses were unified by the power of the Holy Spirit and saw "tongues, as of fire" (Acts 2:3)

Ordinary time doesn't need to be "ordinary," and is not meant to mean that somehow we get a break from the Liturgical Year. (Or that the Pastor shortens his message on Sunday morning). The opposite is true. Many important liturgical celebrations fall during Ordinary Time, including, Trinity Sunday and All Saints Day.

So let's have a prayer that will help us to be "Extraordinary" during this "Ordinary Time":
"Lord Jesus I know that all human relations take time if they are to grow and deepen. This is also true of my relations with You, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, which must grow over the course of my life. However, this growth is not automatic; time alone means nothing unless I add earnest efforts to it. You have inspired Your Church to set aside special times when this

growth can develop more intensely, the special seasons of the Church Year. If I fail to move toward You during these times, I waste precious opportunities and endanger my spiritual life. Help me to take them seriously and make a real attempt to use them well, so that I may grow into the person You want me to be. (New Saint Joseph People's Prayer Book)

You really are "Extraordinary" and you make an "Ordinary" person like me humbled to be your Pastor. Grace & Peace-

God's Country Cooperative Parish Work Projects for 2011:

Members looking for a Mission work project next summer are invited to head north to the U.P. small household repair projects will take place the weeks of June 19, 2011 and July 24, 2011. You will travel on Sunday and Saturday and work 5 days (Monday-Friday) in any of the 7 communities that make up God's Country Parish.

Cost for hosing and materials will probably range between \$150-\$225. Food and travel expenses are in addition. Small house repairs could involve building ramps, painting, doing shingle work or select wood projects.

One or two people can go and be placed on a team of 5-10 people or a church going can make up their own team of 5-10 people.,

Churches in the work community will prepare 1 dinner during the week in

appreciation of help by work team members. Otherwise workers will have to prepare their own meals.

Accommodations will differ between church communities. You might stay in a church, at a camp ground or in cabins. Since accommodations are limited, you will stay within a 30 mile distance from work site.

If this work project interests you, this information is being provided so you can plan ahead- especially if you need to plan vacation time from work.

Money for Liberia and Haiti

Sunday, May 16th a collection was taken for 3 causes in Haiti and Liberia.

1) The Liberia Conferences is in need of a new truck. They are in desperate need of this truck so as to transport important materials and supplies from Monrovia, the Capital, to churches served by this conference. Many of these churches are in rugged rural areas that were hard hit by Civil war. This new truck will make the journeys to these areas easier.

2) The money for Haiti will be used for hot lunch meals for 20,000 primary school children. Often this is the only meal during the day children will receive. Haiti is one of the poorest countries in the world. The recent destructive hurricane left the nation with even less resources.

3) Liberia will also use their donation to feed children left orphaned or from poor families their hot meals, too. Paint Creek members are to be applauded for their generous financial help to aid those less fortunate.

Treva was born in Newark, Ohio, (the oldest of two girls), and graduated from Newark High School, where she had followed a business curriculum. She lived in Newark until 1950, when she married her husband, Lee.

She and Lee lived in various Ohio towns, including Mansfield and Akron. He worked as a controller-manager at Borden Daisy and Ice Cream for 44 years before retiring. They moved to Ridgewood St. in Oakland Township in 1965. They raised 2 daughters and a son. Treva's husband died in 1994.

Before Treva married she had worked as a typist in a Newark business office. After their children were raised, she worked for 20 years at various pharmacies. She retired from Morton Pharmacy in Rochester in 1991.

Treva attended a small country Methodist church that was over 200 years old in Newark, Ohio. From 1965 to 1981 she attended St. Paul's Methodist in Rochester. Then she and Lee decided to return to her early church roots and thus joined tiny Paint Creek UMC, since it was a small country church and close to their home. When she goes south now for the winter, she attends a Methodist church there.

As a child, Treva belonged to a 4-H club where she learned sewing and dress-making. As an adult, she made her own clothes and her children's clothes, then taught her kids how to make their own clothing!

Treva's 2 daughters live in South Lyon and Tuckerville, Georgia (near Atlanta). Her son lives in Waterville, Ohio, (near Toledo).

Treva has 3 grandsons, ages 29, 20, and 18.

Treva enjoys golf, doing activities with friends, reading (mostly historical novels), playing cards and traveling. For several years, she and Lee had belonged to "Hicks and Chicks", a square dancing group. She took up golf after her husband's death – (she's not a serious golfer and never worries about her score, she says!)

Treva drives to Gulf Shores, Alabama every year to spend winter months there. She leaves the day after Thanksgiving, visiting her children along the way. She is back at her condo in Lake Orion April 1st. She has made this trip to the sunny coast for 16 years.

Treva is a member at Paint Creek UMC, but also attends the earlier service at Howarth UMC whenever she has an event early in the day. She enjoys both churches! At one time Treva was a member of United Methodist Women at both St. Paul's UMC and Paint Creek. Although she is no longer an active member of UMW at Paint Creek, she is supportive of their activities.

Treva has traveled extensively in both the United States and Europe. Many of her stateside trips were with her husband when he made business trips around the country. Recently she made a journey overseas.

Reasons mentioned by Treva for attending Paint Creek and Howarth are that she likes small country churches, enjoys the friendly people and the companionship, and thoroughly enjoys the minister! And we all
