### Partnership creates Sierra Leone clinic

MANONKOH VILLAGE, Sierra Leone — People needing health care in the remote communities in northern Sierra Leone used to be in dire straits. Pregnant women in labor and people with other health emergencies were rushed from these communities on motorbikes through a stretch of bad road to the provincial capital for treatment. All that changed on June 4 when the United Methodist Sierra Leone Annual (regional) Conference, in partnership with United Methodists in Minnesota, dedicated a \$60,000 health facility in Manonkoh Village.

### Haiti recovery continues at 6-month mark

NEW YORK — July 12 marked the six-month anniversary of the massive earthquake in Haiti. During that period, the United Methodist Committee on Relief has re-opened a field office in Port-au-Prince, providing immediate assistance to survivors and laying the groundwork for long-term recovery. The Methodist Church of Haiti and the U. S. annual (regional) conferences and congregations of The United Methodist Church are partners in the endeavor. ### Pastor revives young adult group

PLEASANT VALLEY, Wis. — Ken Rheingans, a youth pastor at a small church in Wisconsin, has taken a page from the past to resurrect a worldwide association for United Methodist young adults. He discovered the Epworth League, a young adult organization associated with the Methodist Church that had been successful in the late 1800s to mid-1900s. Rheingans found many of the concepts of that era were still relevant to young adults today. Others agree. More than 1,000 people have signed up to be part of a revived Epworth League since its Facebook page launched in May.

### Red Bird school seeks funds to reopen

BEVERLY, Ky. — After 89 years of educating and shaping the faith of youngsters in impoverished Appalachia, Red Bird Mission School is at risk of shutting its doors. In May, the Red Bird Mission Board voted to suspend classes during the 2010-11 academic year. The kindergarten-through-12<sup>th</sup>-grade school, with operating expenses of about \$1.8 million last year, needs to build up its cash reserves after years of dwindling donations. Still, the mission's new executive director, Taylor Collins, has hopes the school can reopen this fall. He has set a goal of raising \$1 million by Aug. 1.
