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

Nashville, Tenn. – The denomination's revamped website for young-adult spiritual seekers, <u>RethinkChurch.org</u>, will debut Friday, Nov. 12. This marks the website's beta launch, a period when the website is fine-tuned amid real-world exposure.

"Research shows that young adults tend to embrace their digital and physical worlds as one," said the Rev. Larry Hollon, chief executive of United Methodist Communications. "This age group favors exploring new concepts and ideas in the digital space in which they are comfortable, and they make decisions based upon these experiences."

The first Sunday of Advent is November 28. The Advent Season is always the four Sundays

prior to Christmas. Advent begins a four-week countdown to the crib of the infant Jesus. After we celebrate Christ the King Sunday we try not to get whiplash as we turn the other direction and prepare for the coming of Christ, not as King but as baby, a helpless, fragile, crying baby.

The Christmas Season is very short, beginning Christmas Eve and ending on Epiphany, January 6. It hardly seems possible as the year as gone by so quickly. Is it that way for you too? Since Advent looks forward to Christ's birth, it is an appropriate way to begin the Church Year. However, Advent is not part of the Christmas season itself, but a preparation for it. But if you're a child, and we can all remember with fondness when we were children, it can't come quickly enough as it heralds in the Christmas Season on Christmas Eve.

Advent is a time to celebrate light in the midst of darkness, a time of preparation, anticipation, and hope. The season when we prepare ourselves to receive God's gift of Jesus. Advent also symbolizes the spiritual journey of individuals and congregations as they affirm that Christ has come, that He is present in the world, and that He will come again at the "Second Advent".

We are having an Advent study this year, "Christmas gifts that won't break" by James W. Moore. "What are the Christmas gifts that won't break? They are those gifts that cannot be lost, that never go out of style, and that are independent of the chances and changes of life. They are the gifts that have been graciously given by God." "This Advent study focuses on four of those gifts that also coincide with the four outer candles of the Advent wreath: hope, love, joy, and peace. As we go through this 4-session Cont' on page 2

Cont' from page 1 study, we will receive from God through Jesus Christ and pass onto others the Christmas gifts that won't break."

Lois and I will receive many wonderful gifts I am certain of that, but one of the most treasured gifts that we will receive this year is the gift of *your* presence in our lives. Make unwrapping Heaven's gift the first gift on Christmas morning.

Site capabilities

RethinkChurch.org features more engagement capabilities and content offerings than its seeker site predecessor, 10thousanddoors.org. Visitors may read, watch, comment, and interact on topics that are important both to them and to The United Methodist Church—from the environment, to global health, to disaster relief. An interactive map connects seekers to a church in their area.

The map allows users to search for a local church based upon parameters such as distance and ministry offerings. These ministry offerings are imported directly from a church's Find-a-Church profile, which co-exists on UMC.org. Churches that update their profiles with comprehensive ministry information – including outreach programs, websites, and service and event schedules – will be more likely to appear when a user searches for a specific ministry. Find-a-Church profiles are free and are updatable anytime at Find-a-Church.org.

Audience engagement

While RethinkChurch.org is designed to serve a young-adult seeker audience, the content is also relevant to young-adult United Methodists, who are encouraged to interact on the website.

"We're creating a digital pathway into the life of The United Methodist Church, and that can only be authentic when we're engaging with seekers within the space we've invited them to visit," said Hollon.

Registering as a user is the first step to engage on the website. Users may then enhance their personal profile by adding photos, videos, areas of interest, and more. Once registered, a user may start or add to conversations.

How churches can protect children

COLUMBIA, Mo.—Once upon a time, when you needed a Sunday school teacher, a youth group volunteer or a camp counselor, you just recruited someone. When they said, "Yes," your job was done. Times have changed. Stories of child abuse make the headlines, and churches are not exempt. The 1996 General Conference mandated all annual (regional) conferences to adopt policies to safeguard children and youth, and the Safe Sanctuaries program was created. The Missouri Conference is a leader in Safe Sanctuaries.

Judge rules in favor of Church and Society on funding

WASHINGTON - A District of Columbia judge has ruled that The United Methodist Church's social action agency can use funds collected for the church's building on Capitol Hill for purposes beyond addressing alcohol problems. At stake was about \$1 million in annual revenue, said Jim Winkler, chief executive of the United Methodist Board of Church and Society.

Resource available on domestic violence

WASHINGTON (UMNS) - October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. The United Methodist Board of Church and Society is offering a new, downloadable resource, "Breaking the Silence," to equip United Methodists to speak out about domestic violence. The 23-page study is for use in local congregations. It focuses on the need for communities of faith to address systems that perpetuate domestic violence: causing victims to remain silent and enabling perpetrators to continue.
