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## **Without HOPE**

A popular movie theme explores what life would be like if the title character had never lived. Of course, as the story unfolds, it becomes evident how important that person's life was to all of those he or she touched. As we launched our fund drive for the upcoming warming season, I began to ponder on what our community would be like without HOPE.

The 300+ homeless individuals that we serve each winter would be on the streets, squatting in Pontiac's abandoned houses. These men and women would be vulnerable to hypothermia, frostbite and attack. They would be hungry since there would be no place to go for dinner. (I know securing adequate food is a problem for them during HOPE's off season. A number of our guests have come to the front door of our shelter recently asking if I had any food for them.) Some might perish in fires set in buildings in an attempt to ward off the cold. Without HOPE, they would not receive the critical help to navigate human services and link with organizations and services like the Veterans Administration and community mental health. Without HOPE, people would die from things like exposure, hypothermia and lose limbs to frostbite. And they would literally be, without hope.

Because of you, I know that this will <u>not</u> happen. The gifts you have given to HOPE have been <u>truly lifesaving</u>. Thank you so much for supporting our work! Even though we are small, HOPE's impact is huge to the 300+ people who seek shelter. HOPE's impact in preventing squatting among the homeless is a tremendous asset to those in the surrounding community where there are large numbers of abandoned homes.

Please know that <u>every gift counts</u>. We ask that you give generously to HOPE knowing that the support you provide is truly life saving.

Our journey through the Easter

Season, the Great Fifty Days, from Easter Eve through the Day of Pentecost, is over on Pentecost Sunday, June 12, 2011.

Pentecost celebrates the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles, ushering in the beginning (The Birth) of the Church. On the Day of Pentecost a violent wind filled the house and tongues of fire came to rest on each of the Apostles and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit. Dad was transferred frequently during Pat's youth, so she lived in Buffalo, N.Y., Chillicothe, Ohio, and Charleston W.VA. Before moving to Sodus, MI where her father ran a fruit farm. Eventually the family moved back to Detroit when her Dad started working at Fisher Body.

Pat received her education mostly through the Detroit Public Schools graduating from Redford HS where she followed a business program. Pat then applied for a job at Fisher Body in the file room. She was hired and later became a "Girl Friday' doing various office jobs.

anniversary. Once married they moved to Wisconsin where Stan was stationed. When he was deployed to Korea, Pat returned to Detroit to be with family.

After Stan's discharge from the Army, they moved to an apartment in Detroit, soon after purchasing a house in Royal Oak where they started their family. They stayed within Royal Oak moving 3 times as their family grew. Linda, Rick, Kerry and Mary Beth are their children. The family moved to Rochester in 1972.

In the summers, Pat and the children lived at their cottage on Round Lake. Stan joined them on weekends. Wonderful memories they have of these times with family.

As their children married the Summers family grew. Pat and Stan are the proud grandparents of 6 grandchildren-5 boys and 1 girl-ranging in age from 21-29 years and 1 great-grandchild.

Their son Rick, was a hockey player so they became avid hockey fans with Stan now rooting for Montreal and Pat for the Red Wings.

When Pat moved to Rochester she became a docent at Meadowbrook Hall giving tours and telling stories about the Dodge family. Other interests are: needlepoint, reading (biographies, historical English fiction and mysteries). She also loves her roses.

Travel for Pat has been trips to England, Wales, Germany, and Belgium and from Venice to Paris on the Orient Express. Pat's favorite journey was a 3 week trip to New Zeeland and Australia. She has traveled the U.S.A. with Stan and grandchildren.

While at Royal Oak HS, he studied a college prep program. Upon graduation, he took night classes at Wayne State University while working at Fisher Body.

In 1950, Stan was drafted into the army later being sent to fight in the Korean War. After his discharge, he returned to Detroit working at Fisher Body-blueprint, quality control, purchasing, and engineering departments. He left Fisher Body in 1957 to be a manufacturing rep selling convertible top material to the Big 3. In 1980 he started a business selling needle carpet fabrics. By 1990, he sold his share of the business.

## College's 1970 class gets commencement

AUGUSTA, Ga. – Paine College's Class of 1970 finally participated in commencement exercises on May 1 – four decades after graduating. The United Methodist-related school was closed temporarily and commencement cancelled in May 1970 due to a race riot in Augusta. The

riot and subsequent protests were sparked by the death of a 16-year-old in the county jail. Paine's graduating seniors received their diplomas in the mail. The Class of 1970 was recognized with the Class of 2011 and the Golden Class of 1961 at Paine's most recent

commencement last weekend, The Augusta Chronicle reported.

## Meals for Haiti spared when tornado hits N.C. warehouse

SNOW HILL, N.C.— A warehouse used by United Methodist partner Stop Hunger Now sustained major damage during the round of tornados on April 16. But a shipment of the hunger relief agency's packaged meals bound for Haiti was miraculously undamaged. Some meals were shipped on April 20, and Stop Hunger Now has found a temporary storage space while its warehouse is repaired.

## Bishops seek change in presidency

ST. SIMONS ISLAND, Ga. – United Methodist bishops approved a proposal May 4 that would significantly redefine the role of president for the Council of Bishops. The amendment to the church's constitution would allow the council to elect one of its own to a full-time, four-year position without the usual responsibilities of overseeing a geographic area. The president also would serve as the denomination's chief ecumenical officer.

#### Churches assist flood victims in Kentucky

CRESTWOOD, Ky. — The United Methodist Kentucky Annual (regional) Conference is assisting communities

affected by flooding from the Mississippi and lower Ohio rivers in the Elizabethtown District. In West Point and Colesburg, United Methodist churches worked in conjunction with the American Red Cross to collect and distribute more than 63 gallons of bleach and 60 cleaning buckets to help those whose homes were inundated by floodwaters.
