All payments for our 2011 mission commitments have been paid as of September. Each newsletter has featured 2 of our pledged missions. Two more are now being spotlighted:

Bishop Judith Craig Children's Home: Because of the internal was that Liberia experienced, many children were orphaned and on the streets surviving anyway they could. Bishop Judith Craig established a home in Monrovia to alleviate the trauma and suffering these orphaned children experienced. We supported this cause by donating \$25.00

#### Pastors' Salary Support:

Due to the war in Liberia, many of the churches were destroyed and pastors were run out of the country. The Liberia Conference of the United Methodist Church has since rebuilt and restored churches in the country. To support the pastor's who oversee these churches; Paint Creek donates \$100.00 toward their salary.

<u>Loose Change and Missions:</u> Loose change in the collection plate and birthday money goes to support our mission pledges. You are encouraged to drop any loose change you collect during the week into the collection plate. We pledged \$1375.00 towards twelve different missions in 2011.

## Paint Creek Person of Faith – Becky Bunner

Becky was born in Murray, Kentucky (one of 9 children), but her family moved to Berkley, Michigan when she was only 6 weeks old! One sister & one brother are still alive.

Both of her parents had been orphans, so it was important to them to have a family and to focus especially on their children. Her mother was a stay-athome mom. In Berkley they lived on a farm.

But during the depression financial trouble led her dad to work at Ford Motor Company, trying to earn enough to save the farm. However, they lost the farm anyway. Becky saw and experienced a lot of hardship as a "depression child". Her dad later went to work as an insurance salesman.

Becky lived in Berkley until she married. She graduated from Berkley High School, then went to Beauty School and studied electrolysis. When living near Rochester later, she opened her own business downtown and practiced electrolysis for 30 years!

She and Ross Bunner were married in 1942 and were together for 67 years! Becky was widowed in August, 1009. When first married, they lived in Hazel Park, and then moved to open country north of Rochester. She has lived at that same address now for 55 years!

Ross worked at General Motors as a graphic illustrator; Becky stayed at home to raise their son and daughter, then started her electrolysis business in Rochester. She has 2 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren! Her daughter lives in the area and her son lives at home with Becky.

The Bunner family used their travel trailer to tour Michigan and Canada. They also had a cottage at Boyne City. She still has that cottage, but is trying to sell it.

Always being a Methodist, Becky and her family began attending Paint Creek in the 1950's, after being invited to come by a neighbor. She joined Paint Creek when Rev. Liscomb was the Pastor.

Becky participated in many activities at Paint Creek, including teaching Sunday School, helping with dinners, and last year helping with Goodison Good Tyme bake sale. She remembers that at one dinner Walter Reuther helped wash dishes to clean up after the dinner! Her husband, Ross, sang in the choir.

Becky loves the friendly atmosphere at Paint Creek, "feels very comfortable there", and enjoys the people and Pastor Tom. If you haven't met Becky, look for the tiny lady who always has a smile on her face!

EL PASO, Texas — The Rev. Lorenza Andrade-Smith sold her house, her car and most of her possessions, and has been living on the streets for the last six months. "I am in my new job, and this is my ministry," she said. "I am taking a vow of poverty, and I am dedicating myself to learn to live on the streets for three years to understand the plight of the homeless and the needy."
