So how are you doing so far during this Lenten Season with your commitment of repentance and spiritual renewal as we journey together to experience the promise of Easter's life?

It may help you to remember that Lent is less about giving up than taking on. Lent is our annual opportunity to take on that which will enable us to draw closer to the presence and power of God like family prayer and praise time.

Going through the season of Lent reminds us that we never know what direction life will take. Going through Lent helps us to understand all the years of God-work that go into making one's life a thing of beauty. So we want to be careful not to rush the process so that the flaws will show through.

Going through the season of Lent allows us time to do some soul tending. Lenna Vay Devitt of Rochester, MI died on March 19, 2012 in Rochester Hills. Lenna Vay was born on May 22, 1930 to Charles E. Smith and Nettie Bender Smith on a farm in Norwich Township, Missaukee County, MI. She attended the Moorestown School and later graduated from Lake City High School. She graduated from Central Michigan University and obtained a teaching certificate. Later she earned her MA degree from the University of Michigan. Her teaching career included schools in Bay County, MI and Saginaw, MI. She and Calvin Devitt were married on August 11, 1962 at the Jefferson Avenue United Methodist Church, Saginaw. When they went overseas, Lenna Vay taught reading at the United States Navy Dependents School in Degirmendere, Turkey, and later taught second grade for DODDS – the Department of Defense Dependents Schools- in Wiesbaden, Germany. She later worked for the Rochester Schools, (Reuther and Hugger) retiring in 1996. She is survived by husband Cal, daughter Amy Devitt of

Muskegon; son Steven at home; daughter Laura (Anthony) Moggio of Rochester. Grandchildren Amanda McNerney of Muskegon and William and Violet Moggio of Rochester. Great Granddaughter Allie Buchner of Muskegon. Brothers Garth (Beverly, the late Edna) and Frank (Betty, the late Nellie and Lucille) Smith. The youngest of sixteen children, Lenna Vay's siblings who preceded her in death: Ralph (the late Beatrice) Smith; Juanita (the late Lyle) Whipple; Geraldine (the late Nigel) Spohn; Hilliard (the late Josephine) Smith; Edgar (the late Freda) Smith; Brooks Smith; Donna (the late Israel Gundy and Russell Lawhead) Lawhead; Iris Smith; Janette (the late Steve) Novak; and Fred Smith. Three brothers died in childhood. Thursday, March 22. Funeral service Friday at 11:00 a.m., March 23 at the Paint Creek United Methodist Church, 4420 Collins Rd., Rochester, 48306, (just a short distance off Orion Road in Goodison). She will be in state at 10:00 a.m.; Lenna Vay was a loving wife, beloved and devoted mother, proud grandma and great-grandma. She had a strong faith and loved her Savior, Jesus Christ. She also enjoys being around elderly people, studying the history of Rochester, touring houses, and very much loves animals. She loves to get into genealogy, and has researched her father's family, going back 5 generations.

Elizabeth has been to New Orleans, Chicago, West Virginia, Washington DC, North and South Caroline, Florida, New York and went camping around Michigan.

When she was driving a school

bus on Collins Road on her way to and from Baldwin School, she saw the sign about dogs being welcome at Paint Creek Church. So she returned with her dog, Cocoa!

People in **Dexter**, are recovering today from a tornado that struck the community, and the Detroit Conference is actively involved in bringing assistance to those who have been affected by the storm.

"The devastating winds of a tornado cut a swath of destruction through Dexter," said Bishop Jonathan D. Keaton. "May the winds of the Holy Spirit breathe on our hearts and minds to help our brothers and sisters who are reeling from the impact of the storm."

Disaster response personnel from the Detroit Conference, with assistance from Jeremy Wicks, the disaster response coordinator for the West Michigan Conference, have been assessing the damage in Dexter. In addition, the conference has been in contact with Tom

Hazelwood, assistant general secretary for disaster response for the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) to begin the process of requesting UMCOR's assistance.

Leaders from Dexter United Methodist Church, including the Rev. Matt Hook, and the Ann Arbor District are already involved in the community care response efforts. Through their direction, and with the guidance of UMCOR, specific volunteer opportunities will be made available. **At this point, only monetary donations are requested.**

What do general agencies do?

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — As the 2012 General Conference approaches, United Methodist News Service is offering information to help readers better understand how the church works. Hope rises above flood damage in Minot

MINOT, N.D. — Recovery from last summer's massive flooding in Minot, N.D., has been painstaking, but hope for the future is rising.

Beginning April 1, United Methodists heading to Minot to volunteer can count on Hope Village, located on the Our Savior Lutheran Church campus, for food and housing. Some observers view Hope Village, the first ecumenical, cooperative venture of this scope, as a possible model for future disaster response across the United States.

Japan's Christians active in quake relief

NEW YORK — A year after a devastating earthquake/tsunami crippled the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear plant, Japanese Christians — in northern Japan and nationwide — are grappling with radiation concerns. "In our area, the government says it's not a problem, it's not dangerous at all," said Jonathan McCurley, a United Methodist missionary based at the Asian Rural Institute. "But a lot of people are very concerned that's not necessarily true."
