FYI:

CONFERNCE CANE

The cane is made of wood from the church in Adrian, Mich., where the Detroit Conference was organized in 1856. Several wood inserts are included in the cane, representing different historical periods of the conference.

Those inserts include:

*wood from the first Methodist Episcopal Church, erected in Michigan in 1818 at River Rouge;

*wood from the first bookcase of the Rev. Seth Reed, custodian of the cane from 1905-1924;

*wood from the tree near the resting place of Barbara Heck, a pioneering Methodist woman in America

*wood from the church where

Judson Collins, the first American Methodist missionary to China, was converted; and

*wood from the pulpit used by Robert Strawbridge.

The conference commission on archives and history, in collaboration with the appointive cabinet, will determine the next holder of the conference cane and make the presentation.
