
The Two Debtors

(Based on Luke 7:36-50)



One day a Pharisee named Simon invited Jesus for dinner. "Sure," answered Jesus and he entered Simon's house and sat down.






Then she started kissing Jesus' feet and she rubbed special perfume ointment on them.
